The Information Technology Industry in Philadelphia

Information Technology (IT) is a very broad term that refers to companies or jobs dealing with computers, including computer hardware, computer software, telecommunications, and generally anything having to do with the movement of information or the systems that allow communication.¹

The IT industry offers products and services for both everyday people (ex. personal computers, mobile phones, video game consoles) and businesses (ex. databases, enterprise software). There are companies that just do IT, but many companies have IT departments to support their main business.

Many IT jobs do not require a college degree and they generally fall into three groups. The first is **programming and software**, where you are using coding languages. The second is **IT support and services**, where you are helping people choose, set up, and troubleshoot IT. The third is **cybersecurity**, where you help companies prevent and respond to hacking, data leaks, and other security issues. Here are some examples of IT careers in each of the three groups:


