After five years as a board member, I was honored to begin my leadership as Chair of the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation Board in the year we welcomed our new President and Director Kelly Richards. Kelly brings to this role strong leadership, organizational and operational skills, and a passion for libraries and what they can enable in our many diverse communities.

Despite the challenges of recent years, the Free Library, with critical support from the Foundation, continued to deliver on its mission to advance literacy, quide learning, and inspire curiosity. In fiscal year 2022, the Free Library further expanded virtual programs and services, while gradually returning to in-person activities, welcoming over 1.4 million visits to its 54 library locations and nearly 1.7 million visits to its website.

With the Foundation's support, the Free Library aided job seekers by hosting career fairs and expanding online services, and augmented the City's digital equity plan by distributing hot spots and tablets across the city. The Literacy Enrichment Afterschool Program (LEAP) supported students in neighborhood libraries and online as they returned to classroom learning. Additionally, initiatives such as the In the Path of Islam exhibition and programs, which were curated by community members, celebrated diverse voices. These and many more educational, cultural, and supportive resources funded by the Foundation enhance the Free Library's unique and vital role in our region.

The City of Philadelphia's fiscal year 2023 budget provides a historic increase of more than \$13 million for the Free Library of Philadelphia. This increase enables our neighborhood libraries to resume five-day service with the addition of more than 300 employees, and the Foundation, with your generous gifts, will continue to fund critical programs that are making a difference in our communities.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I extend my thanks to all our donors, who give because they share our commitment to the value of this institution, which enriches so many lives.

An additional \$2 million for digital materials and \$675,000 for executive/leadership staff was added in the amendments by City Council. The City's funding provides for the essential operations and staffing throughout the organization, and contributions secured by the Foundation from donors help to care for and showcase the Library's impressive special collections; provide opportunities for civic dialogue at neighborhood libraries, the Parkway Central Library, and online; offer a full suite of childhood, family, and adult literacy programs; support job seekers; and much more.

There is so much that excites me about partnering with you to sustain and expand the Free Library's services to Philadelphia communities. I am thrilled to begin this new chapter together, and thank you for your partnership on this journey.





Welcoming Kelly Richards

On January 14, 2022, the Free Library of Philadelphia and Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation welcomed Kelly Richards as president and director. Prior to this appointment, Kelly served as director of the Muskegon Area District Library in Michigan and president of the Michigan Library Association. He brings with him almost three decades of library experience. He began his career in library services in the Las Veqas Clark County Library District, and also worked in the Genesee District Library in Flint, Michigan, before taking on the role of director in Muskegon. In addition, Kelly served as the chairperson for Lakeshore Ethnic Diversity Alliance, an organization that trains government agencies and businesses in principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion/belonging. Kelly earned an Associate of Arts and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice at Ferris State University and a Masters in Library and Information Science at the University of Pittsburgh.

Kelly shares, "As president and director, my goal is to build a stronger Library, and incorporating

diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) thoroughly into our organization is essential." In his first six months, Kelly designated the Library's Office of Diversity and Inclusion to manage the Library's Human Resources department. "This move will build trust between all levels of the organization," he continues. "It will ensure staff has the training and development necessary to learn and grow and carry out their work to the best of their abilities; and it will ensure intentional systems change that speaks to the world of today inside and outside of the Library."

Among Kelly's top priorities has been to secure stable five-day Library service across the neighborhood libraries. Demonstrating the Library's need for increased staffing to fulfill this objective, Kelly has worked in partnership with Mayor Jim Kenney and City Council to increase city funding for the Library in fiscal year 2023 to support the hiring of more than 300 additional staff, which will help stabilize five-day service across the 54 libraries.

Advancing Opportunities for Library Staff

The Education Assistance Fund was established by the Foundation's Board of Directors in 2020, to assist staff in pursuit of a first-time bachelor's or associate degree as a path to career advancement. The program's goals are to provide financial assistance to employees throughout the Library, Foundation, and the Rosenbach Museum & Library who are working toward their post-secondary degrees, support their upward mobility, and increase diversity across all levels of the Library. Board members, individual donors, and staff members contributed to the Fund. In fiscal year 2022, seven employees received tuition assistance from the Fund to study at local educational institutions, including Community College of Philadelphia, DeVry University, Drexel University, Peirce College, Saint Joseph's University, Temple University, and Widener University.





Our Commitment to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Principles

In fiscal year 2022, the Library and Foundation continued to advance our commitment to a more equitable and inclusive workplace that supports staff members of diverse backgrounds and experiences. Dr. Guy Sims, the Free Library's first full-time chief diversity and inclusion officer, continued to implement **Pathways to Progress: Strategic DEI Priorities and Action Plan**, which was introduced in fiscal year 2021.

Dr. Sims introduced the monthly Community Conversations series for staff in January 2022. This program makes space for staff members to come together to discuss and process

Additionally, with support from a generous donor, five Library staff members have received full scholarships to Drexel University in pursuit of their Master's in Library and Information Science.

important issues and themes centered on diversity, equity, and inclusion, including dismantling racism, unconscious bias, and bystander intervention, among others.

ns e The Free Library also participated as a cohort member of the City of Philadelphia's citywide Racial Equity Strategy in fiscal year 2022. In connection with the Mayor's Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, the Library was one of 12 City agencies and offices working together to assess key practices, procedures, and policies to advance racial equity; and to develop and implement action plans to increase equitable impact in our organizations.

CELEBRATING CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING



Vanguard Supports Expansion of Literacy in Early Learning Spaces

The Library's **Literacy in Early Learning Spaces** (LiELS) program supports child care teachers through technical assistance, professional development, and classroom resources. LiELS prioritizes equity by partnering with child care programs in neighborhoods with high poverty rates; those that serve students and families who are learning English, or speaking languages other than English at home; and those that receive lower levels of state funding, where teachers are typically among the lowest paid workers in the field.

With funding from the **Vanguard Strong Start for Kids Program™**, in fiscal year 2022 this program expanded to three new neighborhoods (West Philadelphia, North Philadelphia, and Olney) and added 19 new child care program partners. Partners were provided with 24 virtual professional development sessions, 16 in English and eight in Spanish, for 318 attendees. One director, whose center recently completed the three-year program with LiELS, expresses, "I am glad my child care had the opportunity to participate in such a purposeful program ... My teachers benefited, my children benefited, my families benefited, and ultimately the community is better because of it."

In December 2021, a virtual Family Engagement event served families from 45 child care programs. Books to encourage at-home reading were gifted to participants, which included 898 children ages birth–5 years, and 404 school-age children. The event featured live interactive segments, including read-alouds, singalongs, movement activities, art projects, and games. Each segment emphasized an aspect of early literacy with enrichment activities, at-home literacy tips and games, and Library information.

The A. Morris Williams, Jr. and Elaine W. Camarda Fund for Youth Programs

This year, the Foundation was honored to receive a \$1 million gift to establish this new endowment that will resource youth programming in neighborhood libraries across the city. On an annual basis, distributions from the Fund will support the Library's implementation of at least eight programs for children and teens in neighborhood libraries, designed by library staff for their patrons. President and Director Kelly Richards acknowledged the impact that this Fund will have, sharing, "This endowment generously provides funding for awesome programs that will creatively serve our youngest community members for generations to come. I thank Morris and Elaine for their visionary gift, which will support the Library in meeting the needs of children and families across Philadelphia."

About the decision to establish the Fund, Williams says, "Elaine and I would like to empower our branch librarians to deliver innovative ideas to help our young Philadelphia residents. We need to support the Free Library of Philadelphia to help all citizens of Philadelphia access free education, entertainment, and business resources."





Serving Teens at the Free Library

The **Marie and Joseph Field Teen Center** at the Parkway Central Library serves patrons ages 12 to 18 through in-person and virtual programs, as well as through reference and research support. Though its collection is open to all, the space is reserved for teens for reading and browsing, research, homework, peer interaction, and enrichment activities. In fiscal year 2022, Field Teen Center programs served 5,358 attendees. Programming included the SAT and College Prep series, a monthly virtual workshop designed to prepare teens for the college application process; and Teen Reading Lounge, a nontraditional book club in which teens help to create the reading list and design creative and civic engagement projects.

The Library's Literacy Enrichment Afterschool Program (LEAP) provides afterschool mentoring, homework assistance, individualized tutoring, access to computers, and trauma-informed care. Library staff members, After School Leaders (ASLs), and Teen Leadership Assistants (TLAs) offer LEAP both online and in person in libraries throughout the city. Through their employment with LEAP, TLAs receive and provide mentorship for each other and the K-12 students they serve. While LEAP's online engagement and in-person programming took place throughout the year, in the spring of 2022, programs in neighborhood libraries focused on literacy; science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics (STEAM); and wellness. New this fiscal year was a series of First Friday events for TLAs, at which the Library's teen staff found mutual support for their work, advanced their learning about collaboration in a virtual setting, and connected with their peers.

CELEBRATING EVENTS

Gala 2022: Celebrating a New Chapter

On April 9, the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation welcomed over 250 supporters to the Parkway Central Library for this year's gala, *Celebrating a New Chapter*, to welcome Kelly Richards as president and director of the Free Library of Philadelphia and Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation.

Mayor Jim Kenney served as honorary chair of the gala.

Ric and Mindee Harris, Reverend Dr. Alyn E. Waller and Ellyn Jo Waller, Ed.D., and Elaine Camarda and A. Morris Williams, Jr. served as co-chairs. The Foundation thanks them for their strategic partnership in support of Kelly's vision and goals for the Library and its future service to Philadelphians. In addition to the co-chairs, lead sponsors for the gala included **Comcast**, **PECO**, **Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church**, and **Janney Montgomery Scott**. The Foundation is deeply grateful for their enthusiastic and generous support, and extends thanks to everyone who sponsored the event, purchased tickets, and made donations at the gala or in lieu of attendance.





Gala proceeds supported the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation, which provides critical resources to Library programs and services for our neighbors across the city.

Throughout the evening, guests enjoyed a beautifully decorated and dramatically lit Parkway Central; meeting and getting to know Kelly; eating delicious hors d'oeuvres and dinner, accompanied by the Austin Woodlin Jazz Quartet's musical entertainment; and dancing until midnight. During dinner, a new video produced for the gala shared Kelly's excitement for the Library's work, and featured staff and patrons from across the Library system sharing the impact of the Library's services and programs, including offerings for families and children. An on-site "paddle raise" fundraising drive secured over \$35,000 in contributions to support youth programming across the Free Library system. These funds helped the Foundation to meet the Lily Literacy Challenge, a matching gift incentive from **The Lily Foundation**,

which provided an additional \$25,000 in funding for the Library's childhood and family literacy initiatives. The Foundation thanks everyone who raised their paddle to make a gift in support of the Library's literacy programming.

The series continued in March with "The Importance of Estate Planning: Planning for the 'What If,'" a topic offered in response to donor interest surveys. This webinar featured attorney Angela Giampolo of Giampolo Law and financial advisor Richard Kuhn of Northern Trust, who together presented on the fundamentals of estate planning and addressed participant questions.

The Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation is committed to resourcing programs and activities that advance literacy, guide learning, and inspire curiosity throughout the region, and to helping the Free Library deliver on the promise of an equitable future for Philadelphia children, families, and communities.


Opening of Chronicling Resistance: This exhibition and related programming will showcase what eight local activists, cultural organizers, and artists discovered when they researched the archives of the Philadelphia Area Consortium of Special Collections Libraries (PACSCL). Through archival items, rare books, oral histories, and original artwork, *Chronicling Resistance* counters the systemic erasure of Black, Brown, and LGBTQ+ people from the historical record, breaks the silence, and uncovers new ways of understanding and enacting resistance. *Chronicling Resistance* is supported by the **Mellon Foundation**, **The Pew Center for Arts & Heritage**, and **PACSCL**.

Expanding Read, Baby, Read programming: With generous support from the **William Penn Foundation**, in fiscal year 2023 Read, Baby, Read will expand from its current 17 locations to 26 libraries, as part of a multi-year expansion plan across the system. Read, Baby, Read offers literacy-based programming to babies, toddlers, and their caregivers, and trains library staff on incorporating literacy and learning into programming. Programming includes baby storytimes, baby dance parties, parent circles, and pop-up storytimes at local community sites.

Launching the teen tech lab and maker space: The Field Teen Center offered 285 events and programs for teens in fiscal year 2022, and this new space, adjacent to the Field Teen Center, will expand its offerings even further. The space is undergoing renovations and adding new resources. The tech lab and maker space opened this fall, and will expand its programming in the coming months.

Hosting career fairs across the city: Sponsored by Citizens, career fairs connect job seekers to training organizations and employers from a wide range of industries, including healthcare, IT, and construction. Fairs will be supplemented by workshops on a wide range of topics, including the job search process and developing digital literacy skills, and resources like the Library's free Career Training Database, which introduces job seekers to career pathways and training programs. The Library's workforce development programming is also made possible through generous support from Comcast, PECO, and the Institute of Museum and Library Services.
